Dr. Harn Cherng Shiue ('99) obtained his MD degree in 2003 from the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas, TX. Graduating in the top 15% of his class, he went on to pursue internal medicine residency training at Duke University Medical Center in Durham, NC from 2003-2006 before accepting a cardiovascular disease fellowship position at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, TX. Dr. Shiue recently completed his fellowship in is currently in his last year of training as an interventional cardiology fellow at Baylor College of Medicine.



Dr. Reade A. Quinton ('95) obtained his MD degree in 1999 at the Louisiana State University Medical Center in New Orleans. Pursuing an interest in forensic science, Dr. Quinton completed a five year residency program in anatomic and clinical pathology at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas, TX, followed by a fellowship in forensic pathology at the Southwestern Institute of Forensic Sciences. Dr. Quinton holds a faculty position at UT Southwestern and is a forensic pathologist for the Dallas County Medical Examiner's office.



Dr. Jonathan Anderson ('99) received his Doctor of Veterinary Medicine degree in 2003 from the University of Georgia College of Veterinary Medicine. He completed a one-year internship in small animal medicine and surgery at North Carolina State University Veterinary Teaching Hospital and returned to the University of Georgia Veterinary Teaching Hospital for a three-year residency in small animal surgery before joining Pittsburgh Veterinary Surgery in 2007. Dr. Anderson became a Diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Surgeons in 2009.



Dr. Christopher D. Anderson ('95) is an assistant professor of surgery in the section of abdominal transplant surgery, and associate residency program director for the general surgery residency program at Washington University in St. Louis and Barnes Jewish Hospital. He is a graduate of Emory University School of Medicine and completed his general surgery residency and a research fellowship at Vanderbilt University before pursuing further pediatric and adult transplant training at Washington University in St. Louis.
