Happy New Year to you, and welcome back to campus! Before I get into our January programming and announcements, I want to take this opportunity to thank Dr. Melanie Leuty for her service to the faculty and staff through her work in the CFD. I'm so proud of her and look forward to collaborating with her in different ways as she begins her new role as Director in the School of Psychology. Much love, Melanie, and best wishes.

It's my privilege to continue the excellent work that the CFD does to support faculty and staff in their professional growth journeys. In November, I attended my first higher education conference that was, in my opinion, very much administrator-focused. In the course of the sessions, we heard

all of the 'buzzwords' around higher education right now...assessment, retention/recruitment, the cost of college (for students *and* for universities), issues of trust, career readiness, AI, badging/course designations, transfer pathways, student wellbeing, faculty burnout...all the things. I'm a very practical thinker and I found myself fighting against my initial thoughts of, "sure, these are all problems, but I can't do anything about them. I'm just a faculty member." And while that may be somewhat true, in that our scope of influence doesn't allow us to dive deep into the solutions to some of these larger current trends, I challenge us all (myself included) to look for those things that we *can* do. I *can* continue to focus on relationship-based teaching. I *can* find small things in my courses to continue to update and tweak, so that I'm doing my best to stay current and relevant to the field. I *can* make an effort to network with others outside of my building or build relationships with people inside my building so that I don't feel so isolated. I *can* take another look at my syllabus and try to make the alignments between content, readings, assessments, and career readiness as clear as possible. I *can* breathe and give grace to myself and others. I *can* seek mentorship to help me continue to grow in my scholarship or leadership. As we start the spring semester, I challenge us all to set some small, attainable goals that may positively affect our experiences (and our students' experiences) for the semester ahead of us.

To that end, take a peek below at the sessions and programming we are offering and/or kickstarting in the next few weeks. We have many wonderful things happening this semester. In addition to the startup of our Signature Programs, we are offering a spring Educators' Retreat, which focuses on career readiness and the curriculum. I promise that your courses already contain career-ready skills, but this workshop will, I hope, help participants identify and highlight those elements in more effective ways. We also have two guests joining us for training. Turnitin.com will be presenting a session on some of the new changes to the Canvas integration piece of Turnitin, and they will be providing some additional insight into Turnitin's AI detection elements and what it can and can't tell us about our students' works. We also have

Dr. Carey is the Program Director for CHAI: AI Analysis, Application, and Ethics in Society, an Interdisciplinary Studies degree program, and serves as an AI Fellow for their Center for Teaching and Learning at UNC-Charlotte. He will lead us in a hands-on session to build and train Gems, and I hope you can join us for that. Our Ctrl + Alt + Succeed series has been very popular; it will continue this spring with some Excel-focused training. Finally, *The Association of College and University Educators* (ACUE) has just released a new endorsement program called *AI for Higher Education*. We will be launching a new cohort that will work through these short courses together, so if you love ACUE and want more, this is your 'thing' for spring. Previous ACUE credentialing is not required, meaning you are welcome to join us whether you have completed other ACUE programs or not. For those of you who have completed ACUE, I will say that this new AI endorsement is much shorter and less of a time commitment, so plan accordingly. The information for all of these events is below in our newsletter, and we would love to see you!

Though not a CFD program, I also want to highlight that The Provost's Office is sponsoring a series of larger (\$2,000) grants that are earmarked for advancing teaching and learning. These grants are called Advancing Excellence in Teaching Grants, and they're exciting to me because the funding can be used for some things that are difficult to fund otherwise. The application information is below. I hope you will take advantage of these support opportunities.

The last advertisement that I have for you is that the CFD is hiring for three different positions. We are still searching for our Associate Director of the CFD, to begin after the Spring semester, and I'm thrilled to share that we also have two openings for CFD AI Fellows. 

Then, you will meet with your group for 90 minutes to discuss the materials and applications you tried as part of the Quick Study for that week. Participation and attendance for each of the four sessions is expected; in-person and hybrid options are available. Upon completion, you will receive an ACUE endorsement for AI in Higher Education and will be honored at our annual ACUE Celebration and Faculty Awards Ceremony during Fall First Week. You **do not** need previous credentialing from ACUE to participate.

Navigating the Yellow Brick Road of Collaborative AI in Higher Education

Workshop Overview: The "Great and Powerful" AI doesn't have to be a mysterious force behind a curtain. In this hands-on, play-focused workshop, we move beyond the hype of generic AI-generated content to explore the power of Collaborative AI.

Instead of relying on the vast, unfiltered knowledge of a general LLM, we will focus on how educators can use their own faculty expertise to "curate the magic." In this workshop, participants will learn to guide tools like Gemini, NotebookLM, and



Custom Gems using their own original course materials, instructor-created content, and research. The goal is to build AI collaborators that are deeply connected to *your* voice and *your* curriculum, supporting responsible and context-aware use in the classroom.

From "Teaching the Tool" to "Adaptive Thinking": AI is always changing and will continue to do so but essential skills like critical thinking and learning to learn will remain constant. This session isn't just a software tutorial. We are focusing on the "Heart, Brains, and Courage" of AI use:

- **Brains (Critical Thinking): Evaluating AI outputs against your disciplinary expertise.**
- **Heart (Responsible Use): Ensuring AI-human collaboration respects original scholarship and student learning.**
- **Courage (Adaptive Thinking): Building the "learning-to-learn" mindset that prepares you for whatever version of AI emerges over the horizon next year.**

What to Expect: Play in the Land of Oz. This workshop is designed as a sandbox for exploration so participants can expect a low-stress, fun environment that does not require your 'strictly work' hat. You will have the time and space to:

- **Converse with Models: Experience what it actually feels like to treat Gemini as a thought partner, not just a search engine.**
- **Build Your Own "Gems": Transform your syllabus or lecture notes into a specialized AI assistant that knows your specific teaching style.**
- **Explore Multimodal Potential: Experiment with Gemini in various modes—text, voice, and analysis—to see where it fits (and where it doesn't) in your workflow.**

Takeaway Participants will leave not just knowing how to click buttons in a specific app, but with a foundational understanding of how to lead AI tools through the lens of your own expertise—no matter how much the technology shifts and changes.

The CFD is seeking an Associate Director to begin in May 2026. This administrative faculty position assists and supports the Center for Faculty Development's (CFD) director to execute the functions of the CFD in Hattiesburg, including the ongoing faculty workshop series, ACUE Faculty Development Institute, CFD signature programs, and other relevant efforts. The Associate Director serves as an

The CFD AI Fellows will work closely with the CFD Director to:

- Plan and host faculty and staff development focused on AI
- Lead an ACUE cohort for the ACUE AI credential
- Produce monthly content for the CFD newsletter focused on AI
- Collaborate with the CFD to host guest speakers
- Work closely with the Provost's Office and Academic Integrity Officer to provide faculty with training on ethical use strategies for AI
- Support CFD functions as needed

The CFD Fellows are expected to hold 5-8 hours per week in the Center for Faculty Development, located on the Hattiesburg Campus, attend weekly planning meetings, and participate in the AI Taskforce. Fellows must be full-time, permanent faculty members. Each Fellow will receive a \$3,300 stipend for the spring 2026 semester. The CFD Associate Director position includes 50% reassigned time over 9 months, resulting in continued teaching and/or service in their home unit. While negotiable with the applicant's home unit, this position includes two course releases per fall and spring semesters and compensation for 6 credits in the summer. Assigned time in the CFD is flexible over the summer, estimating 8-10 hours per week in June and July to help with CFD summer sessions, and increased availability in August to support the programming needs for the start of the academic year. The Associate Director must be a full-time, permanent faculty member.
