Tiny Teaching Tip

Ensuring students graduate with the knowledge and skills needed for their careers is a priority for all of us. This requires aligning assessments with professional expectations. A place to start is considering the National Association of College and Employers' list of eight career readiness competencies or get input from advisory boards and accrediting bodies on required competencies for your field. Authentic assessment helps us tailor our activities and assessments to measure learning and skills relevant to potential careers. For example, have students analyze real-world case, engage with the community as a client, and obtains valuable experience working with industry professionals. Tie program outcomes directly to industry needs and select assessments that gauge students' mastery of each outcome. Involving industry partners also helps keep assessment and instruction current as occupational needs evolve. Service Learning Faculty Seminar Applications Due November 9th

Apply to be a Service-Learning Faculty Fellow and participate in USM's Service-Learning Seminar, which guides faculty through the theory and practice of service-learning. During the seminar, faculty re-design a course to include service-learning and teach the newly designed course within two years. A \$2,400 pedagogy stipend is provided upon completion of seminar requirements.

The program is open to full-time USM faculty members at the rank of instructor and above. Spots are limited.

Condensed Community-Engaged Learning Seminar December 12-14, 8:30-11:45 am (fully online)

Faculty who integrate community-based or community-engaged learning into the classroom serve as guides for students developing new career competencies, increased cultural and social awareness, and improved understanding of course content. This intensive training will include 3 morning sessions that cover the basics of community-engaged learning for faculty who either want to enhance their current partnerships or get started implementing this high-impact practice.



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
