Assessment Terminology

- <u>Assessment</u> the systematic collection of information about student learning, using the time, knowledge, expertise, and resources available, in order to inform decisions that affect student learning¹
- <u>Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs)</u> also known as "goals" or "objectives;"¹ the knowledge, skills, and attitudes that students take with them from a learning experience;² describe 1) who is expected to learn, 2) what learning is expected, 3) when/where is learning expected, and 4) why is learning expected³
 - Example: Undergraduate students will be able to identify courses for their schedule to meet program requirements after meeting with an academic advisor at least once.³
- <u>**Program Objective**</u> a SLO focused on student achievement such as enrollment and retention rates, graduation rate, job placement rate, licensing, and certification⁴
- <u>Measure</u> the instrument used to determine if students are achieving the outcome/goal; includes explanation of how the method is used to evaluate student learning¹
- <u>Direct Measure</u> directly evaluate student work; includes portfolios, exams, papers, project, presentations, performances, standardized tests, licensure exams, comprehensives, and internship evaluations; preferable to indirect measures⁴
- <u>Indirect Measure</u> indirectly evaluate student learning by having students reflect on their learning rather than demonstrate it; includes surveys and interviews⁴
- <u>**Target**</u> the criteria for success⁴
- <u>Assessment Plan</u> the Program Description, Student Learning Outcomes, Program Objectives, Measures, and Targets⁴
- <u>Assessment Report</u> in addition to the assessment plan, includes the Findings, Action Plans, and Analysis⁴
- <u>Closing-the-loop</u> the final step in assessment; examining whether implemented changes (such as action plans) were successful; examining whether action led to the improvement of student learning⁵
- <u>Action Plan</u> an organized activity undertaken to promote achievement of the outcomes, or an activity developed by program faculty to improve and/or grow the program⁴
