

<u>MEMBERSHIP AND CLASS REGISTRATION</u> | Email and online registration will begin Wednesday, January 17 at 9:00 a.m. Phone registration will open Thursday, January 18 at 9:00 a.m. Walk-in registration will open Friday, January 19 at 9:00 a.m. Courses begin Monday, January 29 and will be held in person and on Zoom. You may email your course selections to *maryann.herodes@usm.edu* (Gulf Park | GP) and *tay.baucum@usm.edu* (Hattiesburg | HB), register online at *www.campusce.net/usm* or call either office to request registration, 228.214.3277 or 601.266.6554.

<u>REGISTRATION OPTIONS</u> | We prefer members to register using the online system at <u>www.campusce.net/usm</u>. If it is not feasible for you to register online, you may email your class registration list to one of the email addresses above or call the office nearest you and a staff member will enroll you when phone registration begins. You may visit your local OLLI office to register after all other registration options are underway. However, to increase the likelihood of securing a spot in your preferred classes, email and online registration are better options. CLASS CANCELLATION POLICY | OLLI reserves the right to cancel any class at any time for any reason.

<u>COMMUNICATIONS</u> | We email an "OLLI Update" weekly or as needed to keep you informed of upcoming events and cancellations. If you have given us an email address but are not receiving emails, add *olliengage@usm.edu* and *paula.mathis@usm.edu* to your email address book. Also, check your junk or spam folder if you are not receiving emails from OLLI. If you find an OLLI message in the folder, mark it "not SPAM" and/or move it to your inbox. This is the best way to stay informed of current and upcoming activities.

<u>PARKING</u> | Parking lots for the Hattiesburg campus are provided on N. 37th Avenue between Pearl Street and Montague Boulevard. Handicapped-accessible parking is available in that lot and at the building entrance on 36th Avenue. <u>For our Gulf Park campus</u>, parking is available in any lot by *permit only*. You MUST email

maryann.herodes@usm.edu to register your vehicle. No permit is required to park in the Hattiesburg OLLI lots. <u>INCLEMENT WEATHER</u> | OLLI follows the policy of The University of Southern Mississippi in times of inclement weather. If USM closes either the Gulf Park or Hattiesburg campus because of weather conditions, OLLI will also cancel classes. Rely on trusted news sources when the National Weather Service issues a storm watch or warning. Please do not risk traveling until danger has passed.

PAYMENTS AND REFUNDS

How should I pay? | You may pay online at the time of online registration or mail a check to either campus. Mailing addresses are available on the back cover of this guide. **NOTE:** Payments are due within seven days of registering or your place may be forfeited. Gulf Park does not accept cash payments and Hattiesburg will only accept exact cash payments.

What happens if I paid for a class and it is cancelled? | When a class, seminar, or field trip is cancelled, all members are notified by phone or email and OLLI staff will credit your OLLI account the amount paid. May I request a refund? | A refund may be granted if a class is cancelled, or if you notify OLLI you wish to withdraw from a course at least seven days prior to the class start date. If you paid with a credit card, the refund will be credited to your card. Other payment forms require completion of University paperwork, including a W-9 form, to obtain a refund. Otherwise, all credits will be credited to your OLLI account, not refunded. OLLI credits may not be

used for membership dues, nor can membership dues be refunded.

May I use credits from semester to semester? | We will gladly apply your credits to pay for classes, seminars and field trips in a future semester. Members may not use credits toward membership dues.

What happens if I cannot attend a class, seminar or field trip? | If you cancel at least seven days prior to a class, seminar, or field trip, a credit will be issued for future registrations. If you choose not to attend a course or field trip without contacting the office seven days in advance of the event, no credit or refund will be issued.

One of the most influential movements of the nineteenth century, we will place special emphasis on the private and often hidden lives of the artists Manet, Degas, Monet and Cezanne. Part I not required. **Dr. Michael DeMarsche** received a PhD in art history from Stanford University. His dissertation was awarded the prestigious Kress Dissertation Fellowship, and he has been the founding director of three museums in the United States and Europe.

Join us for a pottery workshop on the beautiful campus of the Ohr O'keefe Museum to create a small ceramic platter (10.5" x 6.5"). We will use prerolled slabs, hump molds and textures. Cute Crochet Critters: Amigurumi | \$15

Amigurumi is a type of crochet or knitting that originated in Japan and is used to create small stuffed yarn creatures/creations. Amigurumi differs from traditional crochet in that the product is usually threedimensional "dolls," such as mermaids, ducks, dogs, dragons and other critters. The final products vary in size and style but are almost always cute and colorful. In this seminar, we will learn the five simple stitches used for amigurumi and initiate a project to complete at home. <u>Supply List</u>: Bring crochet needles, yarn, scissors or snips. Trissy Magrath is a hairstylist in Harvey, Louisiana who enjoys crafting, especially diamond painting and crochet. Dr. Christi Magrath is a retired biology professor and Trissy's mom. She enjoys crafting and has recently learned to crochet.

Ukrainian Eggs: History and Demo | \$15

Ukrainian eggs, also known as pysanky eggs, use a special method called wax-resist to create spectacular designs on the surface of eggs. We will learn the history of this ancient art and watch a demonstration of some of the techniques used to create the intricate patterns and beautiful coloration. Everyone will have the chance to practice the wax-resist technique. The goal is to inspire those enrolled in the class to continue to practice and learn to create their own beautiful Ukrainian eggs. **Dr. Christi Magrath** is a scientist and artist/crafter who enjoys sharing her knowledge with others. She retired from Troy University after 20 years as a Molecular Biology researcher and teacher.

The Surgeon General of the United States recently issued an advisory on what is being called a "loneliness epidemic." Loneliness can have a significant and negative impact on a person's physical, emotional and mental well-being. Human beings are inherently social creatures, and, when we lack meaningful social connections and experiences, loneliness can take a toll on almost every aspect of our lives. Today's modern society has driven us from in-person interactions to a greater reliance on online connections, which are simply not the same. COVID made this situation worse when we were all forced into isolation. Many of us still have not fully come back out. When you are alone or disconnected, there's more inflammation and anxiety, which impacts your entire body and health. The solution is to reclaim our social connections. Fostering in-person connections requires that we commit to our relationships and communities. Come and learn of actions you can take to create sustainable changes in your life and better your overall health and happiness. **Krystyna Varnado** has more than a twenty-year career of progressive human resources management experience in multiple industries and diverse environments. A Cold Day in Paradise: South Mississippi and The Great Arctic Outbreak of February 1899 | \$10 Monday, February 5 | GP In-Person

12:00 p.m. - 2:00 p.m. | Seminar led by James Rigney

In February 1899 frigid air from the Arctic enveloped the Deep South bringing the coldest temperatures ever recorded to south Mississippi and the surrounding region. All-time records were set at Hattiesburg (-1 below zero) and Biloxi (1 above zero). We will examine historical reports of the bone-chilling cold, the meteorological pattern that led to the event, and explore the probabilities that the records will be broken in the near future. **James Rigney** is a meteorologist and oceanographer who served 31 years with the Naval Oceanographic Office, retiring as NAVO's Chief Scientist. His weekly weather columns can be found online at *The Sea Coast Echo*.

The Greek Golden Age | \$15 Each Term 9:30 a.m. - 10:30 a.m. | HB In-Person Term I | Thursdays | February 1 - March 7 Term II | Thursdays | March 21 - April 25

Five-Week Class led by Dr. Marvin Kendrick

This course will be a review of the palace cultures of Troy, Mycenae and Knossos. We will pay particular attention to Levantine and Near Eastern affinities of Cretan, Cycladic and Anatolian cultural horizons. The earliest scrips and alphabets used for writing in Greek will be covered, as well as the mythic origins of epic and tragedy. **Dr. Marvin Kendrick** held a tenure track position from 1964 - 1971 at Yale University. With a degree from Harvard Divinity School, he returned to Yale and earned an MFA in the School of Art in 1980. Retiring to Hattiesburg, he taught art history in the Art and Design Department at USM.

Introduction to Eastern Orthodox Iconography, Its History, Mystery and Motif | \$10.00 Tuesday, January 30 | HB In-Person and Zoom

9:30 a.m. - 11:30 a.m. | Seminar led by Robert Hegwood

This course will explore the history and evolution of Orthodox iconography from Egyptian funerary portraits becoming windows of heaven. We will examine the traditions that inform us of its founding, early controversies, its subsequent development as a liturgical art, and its place in the spiritual life of the Eastern Church. Attention will be given to its traditional materials, techniques and stylistic schools across the centuries. **Robert Hegwood** is a retired educator and an Orthodox subdeacon who has held a long interest in Eastern Orthodox iconographic history, creation, symbolic imagery and theological content. He has studied at USM and at William Carey, majoring in Art and English, graduating in 1979 with honors in Creative Writing.

Before then, he served as the *Daily Journal's* news editor. Harrison, a USM graduate, has covered the state's past seven gubernatorial elections.

Good Times on Mobile Street | \$5

9:30 a.m. - 10:30 a.m. | Mini-Seminar led by Larry Hopson

Mobile Street was to Hattiesburg as Beale Street was to Memphis, or Auburn Avenue was to Atlanta. Mobile Street played a key role in the success of Black entrepreneurs during segregation and was the epicenter of African American life. Our instructor grew up on that street and will share many of his memories with us during this session. Larry Hopson is a Hattiesburg native and a veteran of the United States Air Force. Larry attended Jackson State University and worked for 25 years in paper chemicals at Hercules before it was demolished. He attended the Eureka School and is one of the 75 faces on the Generations Strong Wall on 6th Street. Larry has remained active in his retirement years by serving as a substitute teacher for Hattiesburg Public Schools.

Apocalypse Now . . . or Never? Approaches to the Book of Revelation | \$25 Tuesdays, February 6 - March 5 | HB In-Person

2:30 p.m. - 4:30 p.m. | Five-Week Class led by Dr. Daniel C. Browning, Jr.

Wars and rumors of wars, political developments, natural disasters and other harbingers of apparent doom periodically focus Christian interest on the enigmatic book at the "end" of the Bible. This course will explore the Book of Revelation in terms of: A) its literary genre, which was quite popular in the first century; B) approaches to the Book that permit a wide variety of interpretations; C) the understanding of Revelation in different periods. **Dr. Daniel C. Browning, Jr.** holds a PhD in biblical archaeology and served as professor of religion and history for decades at William Carey University. He is currently 40 percent retired but serves as instructor of history, religion and geography at Pearl River Community College on the Forrest County Campus.

A Cold Day in Paradise: South Mississippi and The Great Arctic Outbreak of February 1899 | \$10 Thursday, February 8 | HB In-Person

12:00 p.m. - 2:00 p.m. | Seminar led by James Rigney

In February 1899 frigid air from the Arctic enveloped the Deep South bringing the coldest temperatures ever recorded to south Mississippi and the surrounding region. All-time records were set at Hattiesburg (one below zero) and Biloxi (one above zero). We will examine historical reports of the bone-chilling cold, the meteorological pattern that led to the event and explore the probabilities that the records will be broken in the near future. **James Rigney** is a meteorologist and oceanographer who served 31 years with the Naval Oceanographic Office, retiring as NAVO's Chief Scientist. His weekly weather columns can be found online at *The Sea Coast Echo*.

The Holocaust: A Pictorial of Recounting of the Dehumanization of a People | \$10 Monday, February 12 | HB In-Person and Zoom

In 1973, two men were fishing in the Pascagoula River in Mississippi when they were abducted by aliens. The abductees, Charles Hickson and Calvin Parker, struggled to come to terms with their experiences and sought help from local law enforcement. Their claims set off a media frenzy in south Mississippi, as well as the worldwide UFO community. Hickson embraced the media by appearing on Johnny Carson, giving unlimited interviews and writing a book. Parker, who was young at the time, hid from the attention and only recently published a book about his experiences. Jennifer Brannock is the Curator of Rare Books and Mississippiana at the University of Southern Mississippi. She has a BA in Art History and a MSLS from the University of Kentucky. Her professional interests include popular culture, pulp novels, bizarre books, outreach and reference service.

Runaway Slaves in Louisiana: Marronage and Regional History | \$15 Tuesday and Thursday, February 27 and 29 | HB In-Person and Zoom

This two-part seminar will explore the world of runaway slaves in Louisiana, drawing on newspaper advertisements published in historical newspapers, with a focus on 1800-1820, and Louisiana's transition from colony to territory to state. Part I will be an introductory discussion; Part II will focus on enslaved Africans among the runaways. **Dr. Douglas Chambers** is a retired history professor for The University of Southern Mississippi, and executive director of the Igbo History Foundation LLC. His research centers on African Diaspora studies, including runaway slaves in the Atlantic world. Currently Dr. Chambers is the author/editor of five books and over 20 peer-reviewed scholarly essays.

Her daring support of artists like Jackson Pollock changed the face of art. We will discuss Manhattan when painters and poets rubbed shoulders at the Cedar Bar. We will unpack the deceptive simplicity of Pollock's art and students will come away with a toolkit for looking at non-objective art. **Catherine Parker Edmonson** is an art historian with two decades of experience. An adjunct instructor in Art History at USM, Edmonson is an enthusiastic art educator. She advocates that everyone deserves a well-balanced visual diet and interwar Paris's creative culture led her to study repatriation.
