### TRANSPORTATION OF HAZARDOUS MATERIALS DESERVES SERIOUS CONSIDERATION

According to the US Department of Transportation (US DOT), a hazardous material is defined as any substance or material capable of causing harm to people, property, and the environment. In today's industrialized societies, the dependence on hazardous materials is a fact of life. There are thousands of different hazardous materials in transport. Although industries have taken excellent safety records, fatal road accidents of hazardous material carriers are quite common in the United States, Canada, European countries, China and elsewhere. In 2011, over 60,000 people died on China's roads in accidents that were largely attributed to negligent safety regulations. There was a Chinese highway collapses after fireworks truck explodes, which killed 9 people and destroyed part of road in an elevated highway.
